

FABRICNATION the textile collection

Fabricnation was established in Cape Town, South Africa in 2007, but it has its roots in a bond forged two decades earlier when its owner/designer, Jane Solomon and designer, Jann Cheifitz, began printing and handpainting together in a garage, whilst at Art School, united by their shared love of textiles.

Fabricnation is inspired by the African textile tradition, rendered in a modern urban context with its blending of diverse sources and influences to create the Fabric of a Nation.

Fabricnation textiles are original, unusual and products made out of the fabrics may act as "conversation pieces" in your home/space. Each design has a story and is created from a "sense of wonder" for the world around us.

Fabricantion supports "homegrown". All fabrics are printed in South Africa. Fabricantion prints on 100% cotton fabrics with water based pigment inks.

Fabrics are suitable for home-ware, upholstery and curtaining. On orders of 25 meters + designs can be printed on alternative base cloths and print colours customized.

Selected designs are available as wallpaper as part of the Robin Sprong Wallpaper Collection.

the collection

The Fabricnation collection currently includes 17 designs, the earliest of which was created in 2006. Over the years, as new designs were added some designs were discontinued. The 17 remaining form a time capsule, these designs tell both personal and South African stories. Each design is handcrafted using cut and paste to build imagery and create repeats. Time and care is taken to ensure the designs have a long life. The designs can be loosely grouped under the following categories




As an artist/designer she has exhibited in a number of group exhibitions.


kokerboom forest

This print recreates a Kokerboom forest on a photograph of a landscape where "once were kokerbooms". The Kokerboom tree, a member of the Liliaceae family faces extinction – some say as a result of global warming? If only it were as easy (as in photoshop) to bring these real trees back to life.

Landscape textiles in the home soothe and relax. This print, in earthy grey on cotton linen, works well for oversized cushions, upholstery, curtains and blinds.

Print colour: Charcoal on cotton linen






liliacea

Liliaceae is a variation on a traditional botanical/ floral print. The print investigates the strange succulents that are part of the family, Liliaceae. Printed "with roots" the textile celebrates indigenous South African flora and the healing properties, associated with these plants.

This fabric makes a connection to the natural world. The symbol of the scarab, dung beetle, has been included to represent transformation. Liliaceae works well for outdoor living spaces as well as for curtains, blinds, upholstery and cushions.

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
champion

In the Champion print images from the packaging of basic South African household products have been combined to create a playful stripe. With visual referencing to Champion mealie meal and Cobra floor polish. This fun, graphic textile evokes a nostalgic response. South African viewers respond to the imagery but as the references are visually collaged they often, cannot quite remember where they know the symbols from.

This print works well for blinds, curtains, upholstery and on a variety of cushion sizes. Also available as a wallpaper in collaboration with Robin Sprong wallpapers.

Print colour: Red on natural 100% cotton basecloth

4 Aces is a mix of images; 4 Aces and Induna mealie meal and the Lucky fish star combine to create a strip pattern repeat evocative of West African textiles. This fun, graphic textile evokes a nostalgic response. South African viewers respond to the imagery but as the references are visually collaged they often, cannot quite remember where they know the symbols from.

This print works well for blinds, curtains, upholstery and on a variety of cushion sizes.

money animals

frees a banknote from its function as a medium of exchange by transforming it into something decorative. In the new South Africa wild animal iconography replaced controversial colonial figures on the Rand notes and in 2012 the animals were scaled down to make way for Madiba.

Money Animals works well for cushions, upholstery and can be used for curtains and blinds. Also available as a wallpaper in collaboration with Robin Sprong wallpapers.




bokkie

Is a reinterpretation of the springbok, inspired by the patterning of art deco textiles.

The Bokkie print has a rhythmic, energetic yet calming pattern repeat.

It is suitable for blinds, curtains, upholstery, headboards and cushions. Also available as a wallpaper in collaboration with Robin Sprong wallpapers.

The Toile du Jozi design tells the story of an African city rendered in the faded style of a Toile du Jouy fabric but instead of depicting typically French rural scenes it shows Johannesburg (Jozi) street scenes. Urban meets rural, formal meets informal, tradition

This design is inspired by Timorous Beasties interpretation of a French Toile, called Glasgow Toile (2004). In Fabricnation's Toile du Jozi print the traditional patterning has an African twist and provides a conversation piece in your home as blinds, curtains,

cape town weave

Cape Town Weave is based on a street map of the city center. Roads, manmade structures and natural features connect as threads, weaving together the patterning of this port city.

This geometric, urban, graphic print can be used for upholstery cushions curtains and blinds. It is also available as wallpaper in collaboration with Robin Sprong wallpapers.





no man is an island

No Man is an Island depicts significant places in the city; like the Grand Parade, Stadium and Seapoint Promenade. The different people who live in and visit Cape Town are connected through these places. The boxer on Robben Island reminds us to keep fighting to protect freedom(s) won.

This two coloured, narrative print can be used for headboards, blinds, curtains, upholstery and cushions.

positive power

is a floral pattern inspired by late 60s early 70s "folk/ hippy" textiles - The flowers that make up this pattern have been created by mutating, collaging elements from a variety of medical diagrams of the HI virus. This fabric honors the courage, dedication and power of all people living with HIV who have grown to live and love - free positive lives.

The starting point and motif for this print is the HI virus. This has been used in the same way a textile designer may use a teacup as the main motif for a fabric design. The HIV images have intentionally been used to create an aesthetically pleasing, (decorative) design. When looking at the print without knowing the content a viewer may be heard to express "What a wonderful design - I love it" It is then difficult for the same viewer to express distaste (when reading or hearing that the image is the HI virus) without observing their own prejudice towards HIV. It is hoped that this design works to shift prevalent stigma and discrimination towards the virus and people living with HIV.

This conceptual textile was exhibited as part of the Spier Contemporary Exhibition, Cape Town (2010).

"The inspiration and motivation to create the Positive Power print comes from my work with courageous and beautiful men and women, who live positively with HIV, in Southern Africa. This work involves facilitating body mapping workshops where narrative therapy and art-making are used as tools to create life size body portraits and share (talk about) life experiences."

Postive Power can be used for upholstery curtains blinds and cushions.





about printed fabrics

- All fabrics are handprinted in Cape Town, South Africa.
- Fabrics are screen-printed with pigment inks, which may fade over time, or in harsh sunlight.
- Fabric colours are subject to availability. Substitutions will be made with approval from client only.
- Fibre base cloth has natural colour variations.
- "Perfectly imperfect" all fabrics are hand printed. 3 -5 % variation from sample color may occur.
- All designs work on a 64cm vertical repeat.
- Pattern match specified on website.

fabric care instructions:

- Cold water wash with gentle detergent
- Line dry
- Iron prints on the reverse side of the fabric.
- Do not dry clean
- Do not tumble dry.
- Fabrics can be steam cleaned (no detergent used)

ordering information

- Minimum order of 2 meters. Per print and colour way
- If you require less than 2 meters of a fabric you can email us ,if we have stock we can supply smaller lengths (please note no trade price on orders of less than 2m)
- On orders of 25 meters plus you can customize fabrics (select a print color and basecloth from our collection)
- Delivery 3 4 weeks after ordering (deposit made) or as negotiated.
